

The 4-H emblem is a highly valued mark within our country's history. As such it was granted a very unique status; it is in a category similar to the Presidential Seal and the Olympic emblem. It is protected by the federal government and is under the responsibility and stewardship of the Secretary of Agriculture. The "18 USC 707" marking that appears along the right lower leaf is coding that protects the use of the clover.

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Why do young people like 4-H?

They have fun with friends at meetings, social activities, tours, trips, camps and fairs. 4-H members learn how to take care of animals and plants, conduct science experiments, redecorate their rooms, fix their bikes, take pictures, cook and collect rocks. They also help others to learn more about their 4-H project, provide leadership to younger youth, and learn about themselves and their communities.

Who can join 4-H?

The 4-H club-based program is for youth in grades 3-12 on Jan. 1 of the current year. Many counties also offer programs for youth in grade 2 and younger that are locally resourced and driven. 4-H is open to everyone, regardless of race, religion, color, disability, gender or place of residence.

Who directs the 4-H Program?

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program is a part of the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service. Nationally, the Extension Service is a part of the United States Department of Agriculture. Local leadership is provided by 4-H Youth Development Extension Educators and trained 4-H volunteers. The program is supported financially by county, state, and federal tax dollars and private/corporate donations.

How do I join 4-H?

Contact the 4-H staff at your local Cooperative Extension Service county office. Or call, 1-888-EXT-INFO for the telephone number of your county office.

What is the role of a 4-H parent?


Parents are welcomed and encouraged to attend 4-H meetings, volunteer to assist with activities, provide refreshments, be a resource person, and/ or help lead a committee. We want parents to encourage their children as well as others and support the volunteer leaders so that all youth have a positive experience in 4-H.

How can a parent help their child?

Counsel with your son or daughter in the selection of 4-H projects that are interesting and can be conveniently financed. Show interest and enthusiasm in their choices and help them understand what

to do, when to do it, and how to carry out different phases of the project. Assist them with project work, but don't do the project for them. Your job is to teach, not govern; to guide, not to control. Learn to give

increased freedom as your child develops and encourage healthy interests. Keep your child's focus on the knowledge gained, not the awards received.



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Who are 4-H Volunteer?

Adults in the community volunteer to carry on the traditions of the 4-H program and work with the 4-H participants in order for them to have a positive productive experience in 4-H. Volunteers may work in a variety of capacities such as a club leader, activity leader, project leader and/or

committee member. Each individual who wishes to volunteer with 4-H must first complete an application, include references and pass a background check. Successful applicants are then placed in a 4-H volunteer role by the 4-H Extension Educator.

How many Volunteers should a 4-H club have?

That depends on the size of the club and the ages of its members. State 4-H guidelines recommend that there be a minimum of two leaders per club and that if a club has an enrollment of 30 or more members, there should be even more leaders to share the workload and give more individual attention to members.

What are 4-H Volunteer responsibilities?

Volunteers follow the guidelines that are listed in the Adult Behavioral Expectations to Promote the Well-Being of Youth (4-H-785). Volunteers participate in training opportunities offered by the 4-H Youth Extension Educator

which help them to work to the best of their abilities to keep the youth safe and provide a positive, healthy learning environment where all are accepted and valued.

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What do you do at 4-H club meetings?

Participants get acquainted with one another and have fun doing group activities. Meetings consist of getacquainted activities, hosting project workshops and answering questions, business meetings,

planning for upcoming events and having fun. Yearly club activities may include completion trips, pizza parties and opportunities to give back to the community through community service projects.

When and Where do 4-H clubs meet?

Some clubs meet every month during the year while others meet every week for a month or two. It varies among clubs. Any place to meet is acceptable if it is large enough and convenient for the members of the group. Most clubs meet in a central place such as a school, church or community room. Club meetings typically last about one-two hours.

What about officers?

4-H clubs may have officers and whatever committees they feel are necessary to conduct their business. The County Purdue Extension Office provides materials to assist with officer training and meeting agendas.

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What are 4-H projects?

A 4-H project is a series of hands-on learning experiences developed for 4-H members. More than 45 projects are available from the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service. Many additional projects may be offered at the county level. Most projects have manuals or instructional pamphlets to assist the 4-H'er with his or her project. 4-H is a "learn by doing" program. Leaders, junior leaders, and parents

are encouraged to teach and work with members on how to complete a task, but members are expected to learn how to do things themselves and complete their own projects. One of the fundamental principles of 4-H is that through successful hands-on activities youth can build self-worth and a positive self-image. See Projects tab on the 4-H website: www.four-h.purdue.edu.

What are the costs associated with a 4-H project?

Project cost varies according to the selection of project and materials. A member enrolled in crafts might use supplies from around the home to practice the skills he or she is learning and have no additional expense,

whereas a member who buys and keeps a saddle horse might invest hundreds of dollars. Members should consider cost as they select project(s). It should be realistic to the family situation.

What is an exhibit?

An exhibit is an object or display designed to help youth demonstrate what they have learned. A 4-H exhibit enables youth to explore their interests and might in turn be the start of a

life-long hobby or career path. Completing an exhibit and its accompanying record sheet also helps youth to understand and build life skills.

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
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

Cain is a North Montgomery High School graduate and will attend the University of Indianapolis to study exercise science/pre-physical therapy.




Christian Campbell is the son of Jim and Rachel Campbell and is a member of the Clever Clovers.


