How often do you clean your outdoor sensors?



1. SCOPE OUT CHARGING STATIONS

Exceeding the speed limit or driving aggressively can cause your battery to drain faster. It's best for your car if you take your time, and it'll give you more time to take in the scenery.

Finally, as with any vehicle, it's wise to have your electric car professionally inspected before departure. Before taking to the highway, have a mechanic check your tire pressure, brakes, headlights, turn signals, windshield and wiper blades.

Road safety: 6 important tasks

October is Fall Car Care Month. Every year, the Car Care Council takes this opportunity to remind motorists of the importance of regular vehicle maintenance. Here are six key actions you can take to stay safe on the road.

1. INSPECT ALL FLUIDS

Check and top up all fluids as needed. This includes the motor and transmission oils, coolant and brake fluid. You can also take this opportunity to replenish your windshield washer fluid.

2. TEST THE BATTERY

Get your battery tested by a professional to ensure it's working properly. This task is particularly important if you have trouble starting your car or don't drive it very often

3. CHECK THE BRAKES

Inspect your brakes at least twice a year to ensure optimal performance. Conducting regular checks will help you identify minor wear and tear and determine when your brakes need to be replaced.

4. EXAMINE THE TIRES

Assess the condition of your summer and winter tires by measuring the thickness of the treads, verifying the manufacture date and checking for signs of wear. This will help you determine if they can last another season or need to be replaced.

5. REPLACE THE WIPER BLADES

Ideally, you should replace your wiper blades about once a year. This will improve your visibility on the road, no matter the weather.

6. TEST THE LIGHTS

Periodically test your turn signals, headlights, taillights and dashboard lights to ensure they're functioning correctly.

4 tips for driving on gravel roads

Driving on gravel roads can be challenging, especially if you're not used to it. Here are four essential tips for driving on gravel roads to ensure you have a safe and smooth journey.

 Slow down. The key to driving on gravel is to reduce your speed. The loose rocks and uneven surfaces on gravel roads can be unpredictable. Slowing down allows

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you to maintain better control of your vehicle and react to unexpected obstacles or changes in road conditions.

2. Maintain a safe following distance. Gravel roads create more dust and debris, greatly reducing visibility. Therefore, increasing the distance between you and the vehicle in front of you is a good idea. This'll give you more time to react if the

vehicle kicks up rocks or encounters an obstacle.

3. Avoid sudden maneuvers. You can easily lose traction when driving aggressively on gravel roads. As a rule of thumb, accelerate gradually and avoid taking sharp turns or braking abruptly so you don't spin out. 4. Drive in the tracks of other vehicles. Drive in the middle of the road or the tracks left by other tires. Avoid driving on loose or deep gravel, as it can cause you to lose control of your vehicle.

When driving on gravel roads, patience and attentiveness are key. Take your time, be aware of your surroundings and adapt your driving style accordingly.







7 tips for using a self-service car wash

Self-service car washes provide a convenient, affordable way to keep your vehicle clean. If you've never been to one before, don't worry. Most self-service stations are relatively similar and straightforward to use. Here are seven tips to help you achieve sparkling results.

- 1. Know the appropriate payment method. Some self-service car washes take coins, whereas others take only cards. Make sure you come prepared with the correct payment method.
- 2. Choose the right time of day. Visit the self-service car wash outside peak hours to avoid waiting in a long line. Early mornings or weekdays are generally less crowded.
- 3. Park your vehicle correctly. Make sure you park your car in the middle of the wash bay, leaving enough room to walk around on all sides. That way, you can get at all the nooks and crannies.

- 4. Pre-rinse your vehicle. Rinse down your entire vehicle with clean water to remove loose dirt, dust and debris. Make sure to rinse out the wheel wells and undercarriage.
- 5. Wash your vehicle. Many self-service wash stations have soap brushes to scrub your vehicle clean. Divide your car into manageable sections and clean each one thoroughly before moving on to the next.
- 6. Rinse and dry your vehicle. After washing each section, thoroughly rinse off the soap to prevent a scummy film. Some car washes offer an "air dry" function. However, not all. It's best to come prepared with a microfiber towel or chamois to dry off your car for a streak-free

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How to safely pass a heavy vehicle



Do you want to pass a semi-truck or bus? Heavy vehicles have more blind spots than standard vehicles. Their drivers also need more time and space to brake and maneuver. Therefore, you must adapt your driving when sharing the road. Follow these tips to safely pass one of these vehicles.

Before passing

- Make sure you have enough time and space. It's not like overtaking a car.
- Signal your intention to pass.
- Make sure the driver of the heavy vehicle can see you. If you can't see one of the vehicle's side mirrors, the driver can't see you either.
- Use your windshield wipers at maximum speed if it's raining or snowing.

While passing

Accelerate sufficiently, while following

the speed limit, to avoid remaining in the driver's blind spot for too long.

• Hold the steering wheel firmly to combat the effect of turbulence. This effect is always present but more noticeable in bad weather. It can kick up swirls of rain or snow, considerably reducing your visibility.

After passing

 Move back into your lane only when you can see the entire heavy vehicle in your rear-view mirror. This ensures you keep a safe distance and avoid cutting the driver off.

Finally, remember that you should never overtake a heavy vehicle that's turning right at an intersection. It may have to take up part of the left lane to make the turn. Drive safely!

What are the signs of a tire puncture?

Do you think one of your tires has a puncture? Here are a few signs that could confirm your diagnosis:

- The tire deflates
- The steering wheel vibrates
- The vehicle pulls to one side or is difficult to handle

FAST PUNCTURE

This type of puncture occurs suddenly and is often accompanied by a loud bang or flapping noise. It's hard not to notice! A fast puncture is often caused by a violent impact or a sharp object. If this happens, pull over and safely change your tire or call a tow truck.

SLOW PUNCTURE

Slow punctures aren't always immedia-



tely apparent because the tire deflates gradually. A slow puncture is often caused by a hole or tear in the tread. Make an appointment at a nearby repair shop to find out for sure.

Driving on a flat tire is dangerous and can cause extensive damage to your tire and your car. Make sure to act quickly.



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
